The number of tons of waste diverted from the landfill to the recycling center decreased this year due to closing the site at Orschlen.

The number of tons of electronics collected and sent for recycling, a slight increase over last year, due mainly to helping to clear out old electronics from the courthouse and jail.

The total number of tons of household hazardous waste collected at Pollution Solution and properly disposed of was considerably lower due to a fire at Heritage Environmental, who processes our HHW. At the end of the year, there was still a small amount waiting to be picked up.

### Stats at a Glance

Host agreement fees have risen steadily over the past seven years. The host fee was set by contract 15 years ago in 2004, with .75 per ton going to the District and .75 going to the county highway department.



Recycling fees decreased with the removal of the bins at Orscheln. Adjustments to bin locations and the frequency of servicing were made to compensate for the loss of bins.



Total tonnage decreased as the number of bin pulls decreased. Contamination levels seemed to decrease a bit with the closing of Orscheln.

# Community Grants

A total of \$12,029.37 was distributed in community and educational grants throughout 2022. These grants went to fund a wide variety of projects around the county.

- Fountain Park Cemetery was awarded \$3,000.00 for signage made from recycled materials and trees to help replace the many aging and dead trees in the cemetery.
- The newly adopted library in the town of Parker City was awarded \$3,000.00 to establish a children's Imagination playground which would include a recycling learning center.
- The Winchester Mainstreet Association partnered with the Ohio Valley Gas Company and was awarded \$3,000.00 to purchase flowerpots for the beautification of down town Winchester.
- Randolph Eastern School Corporation received a grant of \$700.00 to purchase materials to build raised garden beds where students will learn about planting, maintaining and harvesting fruits and vegetables.
- Historic Farmland USA received a grant for \$1277.42 to pay for two benches made from recycled plastic to place in the newly established Veterans Park situated in down town Farmland.
- ♦ Julie Smiley and the Earth Club at WCHS received a grant of \$141.94 to purchase tools and supplies to help begin to eradicate invasive plants in Goodrich Park. The City of Winchester also supplied funds for the project.
- Northside Elementary School in Union City received an education grant for \$910.00 which helped to cover the cost of taking all the 4th grade students to the Boonshoft Museum in Dayton, Ohio, which features a large display about recycling and composting.

  were not able to take in 2022.
